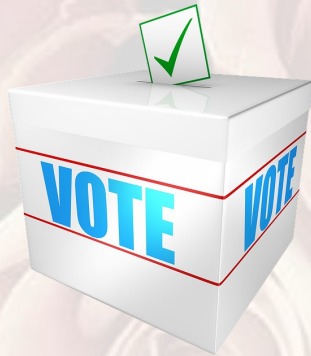

City Election Called for May 7

The City of Rockwall has called an election for May 7 to elect City Councilmembers for Places 2, 4 and 6. Two of the three incumbents – Trace Johannesen, Place 4; and Anna Campbell, Place 6 – are eligible to run for re-election. Councilmember John Hohenshelt, who currently serves in Place 2, will be terming out.

Early voting is scheduled for Monday, April 25 through Tuesday, May 3 (excluding Sunday). Election Day voting will be held Saturday, May 7 from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. More information about early voting times and polling locations will be available at RockwallVotes.com.

Butterfly Project Underway

The Rockwall City Council has approved the butterfly public art project, including design and funding of \$10,000. The pieces have been fabricated by the Rockwall Parks Department, and delivered to the artists. Nine butterflies will be painted by Rockwall ISD high school students, and one has already been painted by local artists Susan Guzman and Cindy Mosby. Students were carefully selected by their art teachers for this high-profile project.

Once completed, the 10 works will be installed in each of the City's butterfly gardens and two public areas still to be determined. The visual art project was carefully chosen by the Art Commission to bring awareness to the City's Monarch Butterfly Pledge. Unveiling is expected sometime this spring.
